

- + vi, pass. be heard of far and wide, be famous; viçrūta, known as, named, 6³.
 + sam, -1. hear; -2. like Eng. hear, accede to the request of, make a promise to (*loc.*). [cf. grū + prati.]
- çrūtā, *ppl.* heard; heard of; *as n.* that which is heard from the teacher, that which is learned; learning. [v̄grū.]
- çrūtavant, *a.* possessing learning, learn-ed. [gruta.]
- çrūti, *f.* -1. a hearing; -2. ear; -3. the thing heard; sound; -4. report, hearsay; -5. utterance; *esp.* a sacred utterance handed down by tradition, a religious prescription, a sacred text, the Veda, 58¹⁸ x.; -6. learning; *prob. incorrect for* çrūta. [v̄grū, 1157.1a.]
- çrutimant, *a.* possessing learning; *prob. incorrect for* çrūtavant, *v.v.* [çruti.]
- çrūtya, *a.* worthy to be heard (of a hymn), goodly. [v̄grū, 1213a.]
- çreyasa, *for* greyas (greyāns) in *cpds.* 1315c.
- çreyāns, *a.* fairer; more beautiful or excellent; better; *as n.* (the better, *i.e.*) welfare, prosperity, 35¹. [from an unused root çrī corresponding to the noun çrī, 470⁴; cf. kṛeīw, 'superior, ruler.']
- çrésthā, *a.* fairest; most excellent; best: *w. gen.*, 1¹⁰; *w. loc.*, 58¹⁰; *at end of cpd.*, 11⁹; best as distinguished from (abl.), equiv. to better than, 68¹⁴. [see greyāns.]
- çräiṣṭhya, *n.* supremacy, precedence. [çrésthā, 1211² end.]
- çrótra, *n.* ear; hearing. [v̄grū, 1185a.]
- çrótriya, *a.* studied, learned (in sacred tradition); *as m.* a Brahman versed in sacred lore. [çrotra, 1214c: for mg, cf. v̄grū, mg 1, and çrūtā, s.v.]
- çlakṣṇā, *a.* slippery; smooth. [cf. 1195.]
- ✓ çlāgh (çlāghate; çäçlāghé; çlāghitá). -1. have confidence in; -2. talk confidently; brag, praise one's self; -3. praise.
- çlāghya, *grdv.* to be praised, praiseworthy; honorable. [v̄çlāgh.]
- çlōka, *m.* -1. (thing heard, *i.e.*) sound; -2. fame, *for mg, cf. v̄grū;* -3. strophe; later, *esp.* the anuṣṭubh-strophe, the epic çloka, in which, for example, the story of Nala is composed. [v̄grū, 1186².]
- ✓ çvāñc (çváñcate). open itself; receive in open arms (as a maid her lover). + ud, open itself out, open, 87⁴.
- çván [427], *m.* dog. [cf. κύων, Lat. canis, AS. hun-d, Eng. hound, 'dog.']
- çvāçura, *m.* father-in-law. [for *svāçura: cf. ἐκυρός, Lat. socer, socerus, Church Slavonic svekrū, AS. sweor, *sweohor, Ger. Schœher, 'father-in-law': for ç in place of s, cf. çaga and v̄çus.]
- çvāçrū [355c], *f.* mother-in-law. [çvāçura, 355c: cf. ἐκυρά, Lat. fem. socrus, AS. sweger, Ger. Schwieger, 'mother-in-law.']
- ✓ çvas (çvásiti [631]; çvásati; çväçvá; çväsityáti; çvásitá; çvastá; çvásitum; -çvásya; çvásatyati). -1. blow, bluster, whistle, snort; -2. breathe; -3. sigh. [cf. AS. hweōs, preterit to *hwæsan, Eng. wheeze.]
- + ā, get one's breath, become quiet; *caus.* quiet, comfort.
- + nis, breathe out, sigh.
- + pra, blow forth.
- + abhi-pra, blow forth upon, *acc.*, 94⁷.
- + vi, have confidence, be unsuspecting; *caus.* inspire confidence.
- çvás, *adv.* to-morrow, on the next day; çvah çvas [1260²], from day to day.
- çvasátha, *m.* a snorting. [v̄çvas, 1163b.]
- çvástana, *a.* of the morrow; *as n.* the morrow, 92¹⁷. [çvás, 1245e.]
- çvápada, *m.* a beast of prey, 84¹⁴. [to be pronounced çvapāda (cf. pāvaka, 1181a): prop., perhaps, 'having the feet of a dog,' çvan + pāda.]
- çvāvídh [nom. -vít], *m.* porcupine. [çván + vídh, 'dog-wounding.']}
- şat̄ka, -1. *a.* consisting of six; -2. *as n.* a whole consisting of six, a hexade. [şas, 1222a, 226b.]
- şat̄-triñçat [485], *f.* six and thirty. [şas.]
